Is a World Language Required to Graduate?

Taking a World Language course is NOT required for graduation, but students who wish to gain admission to a four-year college/university must complete two (2) units of the same World (foreign) Language.

EOC



The EOC is taken at the end of the semester and counts for 20% of the final course grade:

What is EOC?

- EOC or End-Of-Course
- EOC assessment are state mandated tests that high school students have to take to ensure that the students have mastered their courses.

 All Georgia high school students will take the same EOC's.
- Your final EOC score will count for 20% of your final grade. Their course grade counts for the other 80% of the final grade.

Honors & AP Courses at EPHS

❖ Why take AP and/or Honors?

- According to U.S. Department of Education a study was performed which showed by the time students enter college the **Type of courses** they took in high school **is more important** than test scores, class rank, or grade averages.
- The president of UGA says that **rigor of curriculum** is a factor above all others that **determines success** in the college admissions process.

Benefit to the GPA:

Honors/AP courses are weighted.

If a student earns an average of 70 or above as a final grade in an **Honors** class, **five (5) points will be added** onto the final average.

Advanced Placement & Dual Enrollment courses add 10 points to the final grade, if a 70 or above has been earned.

<u>For example:</u> Student earns an 80 in Honors American Literature – the report card and transcript will reflect an 85 as the final average.

Weighted GPA on the 4-point scale –

The weighted gpa is on a 4-point that scale includes all grades on the transcript. This includes weights for Honors and AP weight. (5 points and AP courses (10 points).

Unweighted GPA on the 4-point scale-

The unweighted gpa on a 4-point scale includes the average of all grades on the transcript for all years and does not include Honors and AP weight.

- Average of the final grades in every class taken for high school credit
- Will include **weighted points** if passed Honors, AP, and/or DE courses
- Used to determine class rank, honor graduate status, and any other local use of GPA
- This is the GPA that colleges will use for **admissions purposes**
- This is also the GPA that most scholarship committees will use

PCSD transcript will show your weighted and unweighted GPA on the 100-point scale and the 4.0 scale

(Logging into GA Futures)

- Core Academic requirements on a
 4.0 Scale NOT a numeric scale (A...
 4 points, B.. 3 points, C..2 points)
- Includes Academic Core & Academic Electives (Psychology, Sociology & World Language)
- **Does not** include high school credits completed in **middle school**
- 3.0 g.p.a & FOUR rigorous courses

GFSC removes **local weights** for Honors, AP, and DE courses (**Adding** .5 weight for HOPE gpa & Zell Miller calculations



Hope and Zell Miller Scholarships

- In order to be eligible for the HOPE scholarship, students must earn a 3.0 HOPE GPA (see previous slide) and have taken and passed four or more rigorous courses as defined by the GASFC (can be found on the gafutures.org website). Student must also be attending a Georgia TCSG or USG university or college
- In order to be eligible for the Zell Miller scholarship, students must earn a 3.7 HOPE GPA, meet a minimum SAT/ACT score, have taken and passed four or more rigorous courses as defined by the GASFC, and be attending a Georgia TCSG or USG.

HOPE Career Grant

• The HOPE Career Grant is available to HOPE Grant-qualified students who enroll in select majors specifically aligned with industries in which there are more jobs available in Georgia than there are skilled workers to fill them. These industries have been identified as strategically important to the state's economic growth.

- To register for the SAT, your student will need to visit collegeboard.org. EPHS offers the SAT
- To register for the ACT, your student will need to visit actstudent.org
- *Please note, every college is different in if they require test scores or not. Please visit the college websites for more information.



PSAT Test


- All 10th grade students took the PSAT in October.
- The Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT)
- Measures critical reading skills
- Math problem-solving skills
- Writing skills
- The PSAT uses similar questions found on the SAT Reasoning test; therefore, it is good preparation.
- Predict SAT scores.
- Receive feedback on skill strengths and weaknesses and individualized assistance via Khan Academy including customized practice.
- Score reports can be accessed on student's college board account.

What is YouScience?

YouScience gives students hope, relevance, and direction by expanding their vision of opportunities.
Unlike traditional interest surveys, YouScience uses fun, engaging 'brain games' to capture real measures of aptitudes (natural abilities most important to career choice).
YouScience then translates those talents into real world, high-demand careers.



YouScience interest inventory. Students that are taking world history now will complete it this semester.

Identify strength areas when deciding on a career path or skill sets ...Helps students combine their natural abilities

If your student <u>did not</u> complete the assessment, the student should log into their <u>student portal</u>, go to <u>SLDS</u>, <u>My Career Plan</u>, click on the <u>YouScience</u> for the Science Assessment.

Georgia's Dual Enrollment program allows high school students to earn college credit while working on their high school diploma.

The Dual Enrollment program covers tuition, mandatory fees, and required textbooks.

Dual Enrollment

Perks of Dual Enrollment

- Earn college credit while in high school for free (the program is funded by the state)
- Similar to an AP course, adds 10 points towards a student's weighted grade in the course and contributes extra points towards their weighted GPA
- Gives students a chance to experience college level courses



Important Considerations


- Courses count towards their college GPA
- Because these are college level courses, students must be responsible and communicate with their college professors.
- A DE course takes the place of a course at the high school, and students cannot be at school during a DE course; they must have a way to leave for that block
- If students fail a DE course, they will receive a failing grade on their transcript and risk being disqualified from the program
- They will not have the same school breaks


