Earning a High School Diploma

- To earn a high school diploma, students must take and pass certain classes.
- Each block course is worth 1 credit
- Each 9-week course is worth .5 credit
- A student must earn a 70 or above to pass their classes
- If a student fails a course required for graduation, they will have to repeat the course to earn the credit.
- In Georgia, students must earn 23 credits to graduate.

High School Transcript

- A high school transcript is an official document which records courses taken in high school, grade earned, number of credits attempted, and Grade Point Average (GPA).
- Both passed and failed courses remain on a student's transcript.
- NEVER will a course or grade be removed from a student's transcript.
- Transcripts are viewed by four-year colleges, two-year colleges, technical/trade schools, and military if you decide to attend one of these institutions after high school.
- Transcripts are also requested by other high schools when a student moves, both in and out of state.

Grade Point Average (GPA) and Class Rank

- Your Grade Point Average (GPA) displays an average of all your grades, both academic and electives.
- In Paulding County School District a 4.0 is the highest GPA a student may obtain.
- Your numerical GPA determines your class rank, which is a measure of how your performance compares to other students in your graduating class.
- Honors and Advanced Placement (AP) courses provide bonus points to the final grade of students who passed the courses.
 - Honors Course - Receive 5 Bonus points (grade 70 and above)
 - Advanced Placement (AP) - Receive 10 bonus points (grade 70 and above)
 - If the course is failed, bonus points are not applied

HOPE GPA

- Your overall high school GPA is NOT the same GPA that is used to determine your HOPE Scholarship eligibility.
- Your HOPE GPA is NOT located on your high school transcript (located on GaFutures.org account).
- At the end of each semester, Paulding County School District uploads all high school transcripts to the Georgia Student Finance Commission (GSFC), the group who oversees the HOPE Programs.
- The GSFC will calculate a separate HOPE GPA for each student.
- HOPE GPA calculates all academic core courses and world language courses
- Both passing and failing grades in the core course count; thus this is a merit-based scholarship for eligible students.
- There are various HOPE Programs. Visit www.gafutures.org to become familiar with each of them.
- Per GSFC guidelines, high school courses taken in middle school do NOT count as part of your HOPE GPA (9-12 grade only).
- In addition to a GPA requirement to qualify for HOPE, students must complete Four “rigorous” courses to qualify for the scholarship.
 - These rigorous course are not the same as Honors or AP courses. They are a variety of academic course posted on a list set by the GSFC each year.

Promotion Requirements

- Students are promoted to the next grade level based on credits earned.
 - Sophomore (10th Grade) - 5 credits earned
 - Junior (11th Grade) - 11 credits earned
 - Senior (12th Grade) - 17 credits earned
- To graduate, students must earn 23 credits in specific areas.

Block Scheduling

- All Paulding County School District High Schools use a 4x4 block schedule. Each course is approximately 90 minutes in length.
- 4 classes in the Fall
- 4 classes in the Spring
- Students will take 8 classes each school year.
- Students will take 2 core classes paired with 2 elective courses each semester.
 - Freshman will take Health/Personal Fitness one semester.

Honors Courses

- Faster paced, additional reading, additional assignments, increased academic responsibility.
- Will receive 5 bonus points if final grade is a 70 or higher.
- Example: A student takes Honors Biology and earns a 75 in the course. High school transcript will reflect an 80.
- The HOPE GPA does NOT include the additional five points when it is calculated.

*As shown in the example above the HOPE would view the above grade of a “C” or 2.0 and the high school transcript would show a “B” or 3.0.

Advanced Placement (AP)

- Advanced Placement or AP Courses - Equivalent to taking a college level course.
- Students who take an AP course receive an additional 10 points on their final grade of a 70 or above.
- For Example: A student takes AP Human Geography (the only AP course a freshman may take) and earns an 80 in the course as their final grade. The transcript will reflect a grade of 90.
- Just as the honors points, AP points are not awarded for the HOPE program thus the students HOPE GPA would reflect the 80 (3.0) and not the 90 (4.0).

Health & Personal Fitness

- Georgia Department of Education requires all students earn 0.5 credits in Health and 0.5 credits in Personal Fitness.
- Freshman students will take both Health and Personal Fitness in ninth grade. These courses are nine weeks in length.
- Students can substitute for this requirement by completing three credits of JROTC.
- Students CANNOT substitute Weight Training, Team Sports, or a sport they are participating in with the high school for health or personal fitness.

BAND, JROTC, & CHORUS

Band, JROTC, and Chorus are year-long courses.

BAND

- Students who wish to participate in Band will receive notification of class placement auditions.
- For registration purposes, students will be placed in Beginning Band I. After auditions, Mr. Thomas (Band Director) will inform the counselor which level of band a student will take (Beginning, Intermediate, or Advanced).

BAND, JROTC, & CHORUS

Band, JROTC, and Chorus are year-long courses.

JROTC

- Students who complete three credits in JROTC do not have to take a Health and Personal Fitness Course.
- Students must wear the JROTC uniform once a week as a grade in the course. There is no fee for the uniform.

BAND, JROTC, & CHORUS Cont.

Band, JROTC, and Chorus are year-long courses.

Chorus

- Freshman select Beginning Choral Ensemble I (Fall) and Beginning Chorus (Spring)
 - \$40.00 chorus fee
- *This should not keep someone from joining chorus, please email director with concerns!*
- Chorus uniform required. You can rent a uniform for \$30 or purchase one for \$75
 - Extra-curricular singing activities opportunities (Honor Chorus, All-State Chorus, etc.)

EOC Testing

- The End of Course (EOC) tests are administered during select academic classes and count as 20% of a student's final grade.

*this year with the pandemic the board approved EOCs being .01% of a student's final grade.

- EOC tests are state mandated
- These tests cannot be exempted by a student.
- The following courses have an EOC connected with the class:

English

American Literature

Science

Biology

Mathematics

GSE Algebra I

Social Studies

US History

Other Tests in High School

Finals - Tests given to students by their course teachers that will count for 20% of their final grade in each class. Regular finals are administered in all non-EOC courses. Students may exempt 2 final tests (1 academic/1 elective) each semester with the required attendance and minimum grade requirement (review requirements in parent/student handbook in August).

PSAT - Georgia Department of Education pays for the PSAT, taken by all 10th grade students. Students do not have to register for this.

ACT & SAT

- Tests used for college admissions
- Also used for Dual Enrollment admissions
- Unless taken earlier for Dual Enrollment, most students begin taking the SAT, ACT or both during their junior year of high school.

Other Tests in High School

Accuplacer

- Test required for admission into a two-year college.
- May be taken for admission for dual enrollment (school specific)

ASVAB

- Students take this assessment if they are interested in a branch of the military.

Sports Eligibility

- First semester freshman are eligible to participate in sports (fall/winter sports).
- Students must earn at least 2.5 credits each semester to participate in a sport (GHSA rules).
- EPHS coaches take pride in students who represent their athletic program and our school. They continually monitor each athlete's behavior, attendance, and grade.
- Visit our East Paulding High School website to find the name of the coaches your student should be reaching out to about conditioning, work-outs, and tryouts.
- Every student must have a physical to tryout for a sport (mandated).

Dual Enrollment

- Starting your Sophomore year, students can apply to be a Dual Enrollment student and take courses from a state public or private postsecondary institution while still enrolled as a high school student and receive credit both at the high school and at the postsecondary institution.

Freshman are not eligible for Dual Enrollment

Sophomores can take CTAE courses

Juniors & Seniors can take CTAE and Core courses

- If you're interested in this opportunity, be sure to talk to your high school counselor during your freshman or sophomore year!

Online Course Opportunities

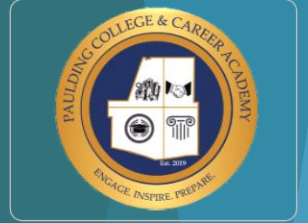
- During the months of April through mid-July, there will be an online registration opportunity for high school courses. Students applying for this may take one high school course. If the course fits within the student's high school schedule, the course is free.
- SB289 allows districts to provide students in grades 3 through 12 the option of taking an online course.
- Online courses need to meet NCAA/NAIA requirements.
- Taking one online course at the high school has a different process than a student taking full time online courses through our districts Paulding Virtual School Program.
- If your student is interested in taking an online class at East Paulding, they must speak with their high school counselor to talk about options.

Paulding Virtual Academy (PVA)



- The Paulding Virtual Academy (PVA) offers students the opportunity to earn high school credits, with a blended model of online and teacher supported instruction.
- New credit and credit recovery opportunities.
- PVA students are full time online unless completing the last class of a pathway.
- No transportation is provided by PVA
- 2.5 GPA to be accepted or freshman may apply and not have the GPA requirement.

Paulding College and Career Academy (PCCA)



- PCCA opened in the Fall of 2019 and serves all five-high schools in Paulding County, and offers pathways that are specifically selected based upon the work needs of the surrounding area and the state.
- Students who attend PCCA graduate with a high school diploma and have the opportunity for dual enrollment, Work-Based Learning (WBL), and to complete a pathway.
- Students are bussed from their high school to PCCA and back to their high school.
- AM and PM session opportunities.
- There are no minimum requirements for admission into the PCCA program.
